The key to the renovation was opening up the space. The dining room had never been used much before, so removing a wall to combine it with the kitchen was a natural first step, but nobody was sure it was actually doable. They went ahead with the plans anyway,



and right up until the day of the actual tear-out there was still a chance that the wall would turn out to be structural and too important to remove—but thankfully that didn't happen. They were able to turn the ten-by-ten kitchen into a much larger space, and now the open concept dining area sees plenty of use.







Allison and Sean like to do a lot of cooking and baking with their kids, so the new kitchen was a great gift to the whole family. Instead of four people shuffling around each other with hot pots and pans in a tiny, cramped space, the kitchen makes the process comfortable and convenient. They credit Lorie with helping them understand how to best utilize the space they had.

That wasn't the only piece of advice they took—in fact, Allison and Sean went into the project with only a vague idea of what they wanted. They knew they wanted it to be brighter, with white as the dominant colour, but beyond that they relied on Lorie to help them explore all their options while keeping them on track and within their budget.
